On October 22, five more of our orphans graduated from Form 4, the equivalent of 12th grade, and this month they are taking their national exams. Board members Crystal Garvin and Jim and Shirley Bedsole were able to attend their graduation and celebrate with them at a party in their honor after the ceremony.

These students have worked hard and are dedicated to making the most of the opportunity they have to pursue education and fulfill God's will for their lives. The Lord has created beauty from the ashes of their early childhood years that were filled with so much tragedy and difficulty.

Meanwhile, the five Form 6 graduates we told you about in our last newsletter have all left the orphanage to attend college. Two are studying human resources management, two are studying finance, and one is taking a clinical medicine course.

In addition, we have students studying business, interior design, secretarial management, tourism, and visual arts. Our first CHO graduate to attend university is now working in hotel management in Zanzibar. Two of our boys are at Crowder Trade School to learn masonry and welding. We have also been able to help four girls start their own businesses (see page 2). We praise the Lord for your support and His provision!

Moving Up to Hebron

Five students are ready to move from the only stable home they've known at the orphanage in Arusha to the village of Sakila, where they will live with their older brothers and sisters and attend Hebron Secondary School. This big transition in their lives will take place following their summer break (our wintertime), when all of the CHO secondary school students return home to Arusha for a joyous reunion and celebration of holidays. They will all travel to Sakila together (about an hour from the orphanage in Arusha) in time to start their new school year in January.

As we have helped our older orphans transition from primary to secondary school and then to college, trade school, or running their own businesses, we are realizing that these students need double sponsorship for a total of \$120 per month to provide for all of their higher education and future success. Four of our young ladies have embarked on business ventures and are becoming more independent. We are thankful for sponsors who have continued to support them, giving them the best opportunity to succeed into adulthood.

Upendo William and Gift Emiliano completed their sewing classes at Crower Trade School, and in October they moved into an apartment near the school and opened their own store in Maji ya Chai, where they sell custom-made clothing.

Naomi Kaanankira and Angel Hamis finished beauty school last year and have been working at a shop near the orphanage in the outskirts of Arusha. Together they recently opened a salon in a new building in downtown Arusha, where they hope to increase their clientele and earn enough to cover expenses and rent their own apartment. They live at the orphanage and take public transportation to the salon for now.

Crystal Garvin helped the girls establish their new businesses while she was in Tanzania. We are keeping in touch with the girls to make sure they have everything they need to become self-sufficient and stay spiritually grounded as well, and CHO staff members continue to look in on them frequently.

He brought the letter to CHO director Steven Issangya, who congratulated him and told him how proud he is of him for doing so well. Daniel then said he doesn't want to accept the scholarship. Instead he prefers to attend Hebron Secondary School in Sakila because he wants to stay with his CHO family.

Steven shared that he still remembers the day Daniel came to the orphanage. His mom is Masai (his dad had passed), and she couldn't afford an education for him. When he and his mom came to ask to be admitted to CHO, Daniel said, "Please! Please let me come here! I want to go to school, and my mom can't take me!" Steven said he wanted to cry...and look how well Daniel has done with God's help and his sponsor's support!
